## About Us

THE iconic Harare Metropolitan Province is one of the ten provinces in Zimbabwe made up of four main pillars; City of Harare, Chitungwiza Municipal Authority, Epworth Local Board and Ruwa Local Board

The province is administered by the resident minister, **Hon Charlse. Z. Tawenwa,** responsible for coordinating and implementing government policy to local authorities.

Harare Metropolitan Province is home to Zimbabwe's executive, legislature, judiciary, diplomatic missions, UN agencies, headquarters of banks and most companies.

The Zimbabwe Bird is the national emblem of Zimbabwe, appearing on the Zimbabwean national flag, coat of arms, banknotes and coins, with a larger statue on the entrance of the central bank building.

### **Historical Harare**

HARARE was founded in 1890 by the Pioneer Column, named Fort Salisbury after the British Prime Minister Lord Salisbury, then Harare in 1982.



Towering majestically is the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, which symbolises the final resting place for thousands of Zimbabweans who sacrificed their lives for the sake of our freedom and independence, but whose remains were never found but remain scattered in valleys, disused mines, caves, unknown graves and mass graves spread across the nation and in neighbouring countries. Heroes' Day is commemorated every year in August at this national shrine.

# **Orient Yourself around Harare's History**

#### Harare kopje

CLIMB up the Kopje and enjoy the best panoramic view of Zimbabwe's capital

city, Harare.



As a popular place for first-time tourists to Zimbabwe, the Kopje is 1536 metres above sea level.


Besides offering a picturesque view of the capital city, it provides a serene atmosphere for those wishing to take a break from the huff and puff of a busy city.

It is also the embodiment of historical symbols and facts that are important to Harareans and tourists.

# **Historical Buildings**

HARARE is home to some of the oldest buildings in Africa.

The Avenues area, on the outskirts of Harare's CBD has a unique combination of historical buildings.



At 92 Baines Avenue, corner Sam Nujoma Street, you will find **The Residency**, Salisbury's first double storey brick house constructed in 1895.



**Cecil House** (1901), located at 2 Central Avenue, corner Sam Nujoma Street was built by De Beers.

**Lo Kia' House** (1902) is situated at 46 Fife Avenue, corner Leopold Takawira Street while **Berea House** of 1903 is down the road at 78 Fife Avenue, corner Mazowe Street.

**The Villa** (1910) is located 37 Josiah Tongogara Avenue while the **Railway's House** of 1911 stands at 67 Fife Avenue, corner Colquhoun Street.

In Harare's CBD, you are spoilt for choice when you go on a tour of the ancient buildings built in the 18<sup>th</sup> century.



**Queen's Hotel** was opened on 31 December 1899 on the eve of the twentieth century and consisted of a single storey building on the corner of Robert Mugabe Road and Kaguvi Street.

**Meikles Limited** of 1892 was opened as a general merchants in Orr Street while **Market Hall** along Mbuya Nehanda Street, present day Gulf Complex is one of the oldest buildings still standing in Harare, built around 1893 to 1894.

**Ranche House** of 1899 is situated in Rotten Row opposite the Museum of Human Sciences.



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## **Mother Patrick's Mortuary**

Mother Patrick's Mortuary established in 1895 outside the main entrance to Mukwati Building in Livingstone Avenue, between Simon Muzenda Street and Fifth Street still carry its history with pictures of decades gone by.

**Makombe Building**, formerly known as the Drill Hall situated along Leopold Takawira street was opened on 2 May 1902 and it was primarily intended for the training of volunteers.



**India House** (1903) standing at 90 Mbuya Nehanda Street was the publishing house for Rhodesia Herald newspaper.

**Former Synagogue** (1916) still stands at the corner of Harare Street and Nelson Mandela Avenue with the **Guild Hall** (1920) a block away at the corner of Harare Street and Jason Moyo Avenue.

The **Town House**, which houses City of Harare offices dates back to 1933. Other notable historic buildings housed along Robert Mugabe include

#### Mbare

FOUNDED in 1907, the cosmopolitan township of Mbare has a rich history of its land, people and culture.

Mbare bus terminus is a hive of activity for passengers wishing to travel to rural areas and other long distant places in Zimbabwe.

Meet local music producers as they do what they know best at Chill Spot studios, who have been leading music producers for the Zimdancehall genre. Chinembiri Art Studio and several backyard studios are a common feature in Mbare.

Built in 1958, Stoddard Hall is a symbol for unity through mass meetings and rallies that were held during the nationalist movement during former Rhodesia. Today, Stodart Hall has become the venue for the lying in state for Zimbabwe's heroes and heroines.

At Mbare West Cemetery are 27 Commonwealth war graves from World War I and 224 from World War II. The Harare Memorial commemorates 66 men while the Harare Cremation Memorial has one casualty of the Second World War.

# Mai Musodzi Hall (1935)



Formerly, Recreational Hall, Mai Musodzi Hall built in 1935 as Mbare's first Community Hall, renamed in honour of Mai Musodzi Ayema, a renowned philanthropist. Here you are told of her works that inspired the Musika, arts and crafts market development and the establishment of the Carter House in the 1950's, a symbol of African woman independence (*female Hostel high class accommodations for the working girl, could accommodate 165 girls sharing 2 each in every room*).

Mbare Musika is where people trade in all types of fresh produce. Siyaso in the Magaba, Mbare is the biggest informal markets in Harare of indigenous traders and manufacturers of building material, car parts, farming equipment, household goods and timber.

Mupedzanhamo, meaning 'end poverty' is a popular market for to buy cheap, second hand clothes from imported bales for as little as 50cents.

A visit to Mbare will not be complete without a meal at Mai Cresta or ZimD Café, for an authentic traditional cuisine offering true African hospitality. Mbare is home to Rufaro stadium, the second biggest stadium in Zimbabwe. Although Shawasha, Magaba, Matapi and Matererini flats are dilapidated, inhabitants share common values of oneness and togetherness

#### **Tourism in Harare Metropolitan Province**

Mbuya Nehanda Statue



A statue of the iconic national heroine and spirit medium Mbuya Nehanda Nyakasikana in the central business district of Harare, the capital. She was a powerful woman and staunchly committed to upholding traditional Shona culture. Mbuya Nehanda is a heroine of the first war of liberation, known as the First Chimurenga (1886-97), who bravely led uprisings by indigenous Zimbabweans against British settler occupation and rule. She was executed on April 27, 1898 by the British South Africa Company, which was responsible for the country's colonization.



THE magnificent Msasa woodland bordering the edges of Cleveland and its pretty views of the Dam provides a relaxing atmosphere for nature lovers.

Canoes are available for hire to those wishing to spend some time in water. Occasionally, you will see some water lover's speed-boating in the dam.



There are two airports, Prince Charles airport in Mount Hampden and the Robert Gabriel Mugabe International airport is the largest airport in Zimbabwe with a 4,725-metre-long runway, one of the longest in Africa.
